## JO SONJA JANSEN

#### (YAY! OUR 2023 CONVENTION TEACHER)

In 1974, JoSonja was awarded a Master Teacher's Certificate by the National Society of Tole and Decorative Painters. In 1980 the Silver Palette award was bestowed by the same organization in recognition of outstanding contribution to the advancement



of Decorative Art. In 1996, the Vesterheim Gold Medal (VGM) in Rosemaling, from the Norwegian American Museum in Decorah, Iowa was awarded. In 2007 she was awarded the President's Commendation award for service by the Society of Decorative Painters.



#### Per JoSonja:

The 2023 CRA Convention project will be a contemporary interpretation of Hordaland, Hardanger styles was painted to be my personal sewing box. The original piece was purchased from the Husfliden in Bergen during a Vesterheim tour to Norway.

Every symbol and figure used is representative of things that I saw on that trip to Norway in some form of decorative art. The people are a wedding couple and their family and farm. Each unit is small so that you can easily adapt this idea to other pieces.

The saying around the box translates: Norwegian Life Tapestry "The threads of life pass through the hours of time, weaving a tapestry rich with memories." Vesterheim Tour – 1993 Hordaland, Hardanger.

JoSonja has so many things to teach us and is our California treasure. You won't be disappointed. I hope you can join us.

#### DIANE EDWARDS A member highlight:



Diane Edwards, 1992 teaching Telemark at Fresno Covnention

Diane is a versatile artist who had an interest in Norwegian Rosemaling since 1970. She has written books on the subject, two of which were in conjunction with Sigmund Arseth. "I have belonged to the California Rosemaling Association since about 1993 I believe. That was the year I published my first book Design Basics in Telemark Rosemaling. I taught at several different mini conventions and one of the major ones which was in Fresno, in 1992. I

also attended several CRA conventions. I first taught at the Society of Decorative Painters convention in San Francisco in 1992...it was unforgettable as we got caught in a terrible ice storm leaving North Dakota and got to S.F. at 3:30 a.m. They told us we didn't have a room at the Hilton and then said, OH WELL...we'll give you a suite on the 34th floor where we stayed all week...bad news, good news!! I taught for 12 conventions at various locations and many minis. Marley Smith, Hildy Henry, Marie Sollom and Jurene While were good friends that I enjoyed visiting each year. I also loved JoSonja's designs and her personality that is so inclusive and personable. I accompanied Sigmund Aarseth to the convention

in 2010 which was great fun as my sister and brother-in-law also joined Dale, my husband, and I."

From the archives: We believe Diane met Marley at the NSTDP convention that she talks about in her highlight section. She is versatile in both oils and acrylics. Although Diane is an juried landscape artist, she like many, was drawn to Rosemaling and Swedish painting. In a 1992 letter to Vice President Marley Wright, she included these credentials: "In the 17 years I have been rosemaling I have gone to Norway three times and have over 3,000 photos. I have studied with 27 different Norwegian and American rosemalers—about 50 weeks in all. I have taught at 10 national NSTDP conventions and lots of mini-conventions. The teacher I have worked with the most is Sigmund Aarseth, we are very good friends and paint together a lot."

Diane has a Master of Art degree and has "taught high school, college and art camp classes." In addition, she taught classes at Vesterheim, Illinois Norse Rosemaling Association, Daughters of Norway Convention, various other venues and in her own studio, Nordic Arts in Ft. Collins, CO.

When we were still a young organization in 1992, she was our convention teacher and demonstrated at our 1992 convention in Fresno (the last one and our 5<sup>th</sup> convention). She taught the Telemark style. Diane enjoyed our group and became a member and by 1994-1996 was our education person who wrote articles for our newsletter. In 1995, in Redwood City, Diane presented a "Make It Take It" class using Deco Art Ultra Gloss enamel paint on tiles. It was an evening class that was a bonus to convention goers. She writes more about herself in our spotlight on members. She loved to come to our conventions, because she had a sister living in LA at one point in the 1990s and it became an excuse to visit her. ## TO ACCOUNT OF THE PARTY OF THE

#### **ROCOCO—The exuberant art**, by Diane Edwards, MA



Rococo is pronounced RO coco or in Europe Ro Co
Co. It was the classical art form and design that
followed Baroque and was followed by
Neoclassicism. Although few Rococo designs are
studied in Rosemaling, Rococo was used more than
any other style of classical art in Rosemaling.
Baroque art design style is primarily used in
Hallingdal and in other "mirrored" or exactly
balanced designs. (Rogaland Rosemaling was begun
by a Hallingdal artist, Lars Trageton, so therefore
also has the central axis and exact balance of
Hallingdal.) Rococo is at its strongest in the
Telemark style of Rosemaling. (Photo on Left reprinted

from our 1998 Newsletter, Number 53, p 1, Rococo example provided by Jurene While)

The coloration of Rococo is seen in the painting done around Gudbrandsdal, Valdres and Opdal...blue green pastels, peach, rusty oranges, pastel yellows and greens. You will see Rococo painted on trunks, walls and in churches throughout Norway. Interestingly, most artists and historians speak more about Baroque than they do about Rococo, but the influence of Rococo seems to be stronger to me. You also see Rococo in the art of chinoiserie, the Asian art that was usually monochromatic, realistic trees, houses, flowers, etc., surrounded by scroll shapes.

Rococo first appeared in France and Italy as a reaction to the formal and geometric styles of Baroque. It was known as the style rocaille or rocaille style. This means "shell" in French according to Nils Ellingsgard, the style is based on the sea and sea shells and waves. I studied this style with Nils in the 1980's when his first book on Rosemaling was published. He did a demo for us, which I bought for the Nordland Rosemalers and he allowed us to make place mats for the members.

I have used the Rococo style borders for years around my rosemaling, on plates, on trays and borders for trunks. It is so versatile. Rococo was a very popular style but it only lasted on the continent for a very few years from 1730 to about 1760. In Norway it was copied from two principle sources according to Nils. One was the cast iron stoves which had scenes surrounded by the Rococo borders of C's, waves and sinuous S curves. Sinuous meaning snakelike, but also described as romantic and sensuous (go figure). The other source was the printed books, Bibles and so on that came from French, German and



Italian sources. In those respects the Rococo painted elements lasted long after the buildings, ceilings and mirrors with exceptionally ornate frames. In Bjorg Kleivi's book Nils painted a beautiful Swedish Mora clock with Rococo, I loved it so



much I painted mine that way, too. In France and Italy Rococo was sculpted into ceilings, frames and often gilded, vines, leaves and flowers were intertwined into complex designs. Countries which were the most attracted to the extravagant exuberance of Rococo were Austria, Bavaria and Italy. In 1748, France turned towards neo-classicism which has the straight lines which were also introduced into some of Norwegian Rosemaling primarily by Thomas Luraas and others. About 1770 Rococo moved into the Scandinavian lexicon and can be seen in many places in Norway and Sweden.

The center of Rococo is often filled with stylized flowers. Flat daisies, small, not realistic roses, and tulips were used. Leaves in Rosemaling Rococo were often dark blue and heart shaped. There were seaweeds in straight, short lines and

there were waves with foam holes that came out of the scrolls. Although Rococo is said to be S shaped and sinuous, the C "shell "shapes are important and are joined by another C on the inside connected with little straight lines in sets of two. Background colors are usually pale blue, pale gray, off white, tan/golden, or rusty red that is not <u>opaquely painted</u>, keeping all background colors light.

Colors used in painting are Indigo, Mars Black, Yellow Ochre, Titanium White or Unbleached Titanium, dark green mixture of blue and yellow; and rusty reds such as Terra Rosa, Burnt Sienna or Lt. Red Oxide. Soft blues such as Prussian plus Burnt Sienna, lightened with white or deep greens (such as Viridian) are seen throughout and Metallic Gold or gold leaf. All Oil colors should be painted in a *transparent manner with Gamblin gel.* 

Acrylic: JoSonja Acrylics: Storm Blue or Paynes Gray (Indigo), Yellow Oxide, Smoked Pearl, (for White) Red can be Red Earth, Burnt Sienna or Norwegian Orange. Green made from blue plus yellow oxide. *Use Kleister Medium to get transparency*. Also you can use Burnt Sienna, Raw Umber, Carbon Black, Green Oxide, Unbleached Titanium, Deep Metallic Gold. I hope you enjoy this style as much as I do!

Rococo was one of the most used styles early in the Rosemaling genre. It came up from the continent in various configurations, mostly Italian in origin, as Rococo style came up through France and into the Germanic countries it became very overwhelming and exuberant. Carved and gold leafed it adorned furniture, frames and rich, extremely over decorated rooms in palaces, castles and the like.



In Scandinavia, particularly Norway and Sweden, Rococo was used as a painted style along with framing floral paintings and Chinoiserie scenes, often done monochromatically. The florals were sometimes painted in various folk art colors seen in Norway and Sweden. The scrolls and seaside waves and shell motifs were used primarily in Swede and Eastern Norway....perhaps the painters from Sweden introduced it to


Norwegian painters. You see a lot of Rococo decoration in the Eastern counties and areas of Norway, some of it has been done by Swedish painters and then was taken up by the local Norwegians. Although the Gudbrandsdal style is usually Baroque, like their carving, Rococo painting was used a great deal in that area. Even the guild painters who had learned Rococo from southern European painters used Rococo in Norway such as Peder Aadnes used Rococo along with more traditional folk art techniques.



When I studied Rococo with Nils Ellingsgaard he considered Peder Aadnes and some of the other guild painters to be more "inspiration painters" than actual "Rosemalers". Nils himself liked Rococo and painted it a lot, but he felt it was a continental style taken up by Rosemalers and inspired their work, but NOT a real style as we term Telemark, Hallingdal and so forth. Hallingdal and mirror image folk art tended to use Baroque as their inspiration, he showed me that rosemaling using ROUND scrolls were based on Baroque and rosemaling using OVAL scrolls were based more on Rococo. Interesting study!

In the last few years many wonderful handicraft books have been published in Norway, most include great Rosemaling examples from different districts and counties. They are not inexpensive but are great resources if you are interested in the history of our art form. Some are available from Vesterheim Museum Store and some on the secondary markets. The very best books you can buy however, are certainly Nils Ellingsgaard's Rosemaling books particularly his 1999 book, Norwegian Rosemaling. His smaller book from 1985 is also still available used from bookstores and other places. One of the problems with Norwegian published books is that they have a high tax to pay on inventory when a book gets older and they often just destroy them. In 2004 I was able to save about 150 of Nils' English translated Norwegian Rosemaling book by contacting the company

just as they were about to burn them....Uffda, as we say!! Of course I sold them in a year or so! They didn't sell well in Norway!
